


2020 was another incredible year for I Dig Trees and for our climate and the environment.

The season wasn't without it issues given the impact of Covid, not least 60,000 trees having to be rescheduled for delivery due to our delivery partner having to isolate, but we love a challenge!

It was another record-breaking year with 370,000 trees planted engaging over 700 community groups across the UK.

As ever, we saw from the groups involved just how inclusive and special I Dig Trees is; from toddlers to grandparents, and from family and friends' days out to neighbourhood gatherings, thousands of people came together to green our towns and cities for climate, wildlife and communities.

Wales



The trees arrived a day ahead of schedule - great!

They've all now been planted. In the current lockdown, I planted the majority of them, but enlisted a couple of others to finish off – it was to have been a group planting with the local Brownies, but alas, they're not now meeting until after Easter, but they have agreed to take on the role of 'Plant Companions' as soon as they are able.

The trees are perfect for our purposes - we look after a heritage apple orchard on the outskirts of Llandeilo, Carmarthenshire, with over 60 different varieties of older variety apple trees, and some pears too. The orchard is on former agricultural land and is rather exposed to the prevailing winds, so we were keen to plant a windbreak - The TCV trees have been planted on two sides of the orchard - the tree pack we received is ideal in that it has trees that are good for pollinators that we need to attract to ensure good pollination of the apples and pears. The hazel trees have all been planted on the south western boundary and will be managed as a mature hazel screen, with occasional coppicing. The crab apples, rowan and bird cherry have all been planted on the long southern boundary, alternately spaced to avoid too much shade on the apple trees. The willow have been planted in the corner of a damp meadow not far away where they can grow to their heart's delight!

Thank you very much indeed for this opportunity to move our community heritage orchard on to the next stage. We promise to look after them as best we can!

Fast Midlands



Friends of Gedling House Woods welcomed the opportunity to benefit from I Dig Trees in 2020 - the timing was perfect. Our woodland, originally part of the grounds of Gedling House, was once a well-established broadleaf wood with beech as the main species.

In 1955, most of the mature beech was felled for timber but, contrary to the felling conditions, no replanting took place. Much of the woodland is now self-seeded sycamore, ash and wych elm. Many of these older trees have fallen or have become diseased and been felled, leaving a number of clearings suitable for replanting.

Our small group of volunteers removed many very tall slender sycamore, ash and wych elm saplings and a good deal of undergrowth from the clearings. The Park pack from I Dig Trees fitted well with our plan for replacement species and 100 trees were all planted on 1 December, the day after delivery, again by volunteers.

The group is extremely pleased with the support we had from I Dig Trees.

London

We planted an area of future coppice for firewood (using the parkland pack). The small plot pack was planted parallel to a line of conifer trees to create a belt of woodland, extending down the main field from an area of native woodland (which included IDT trees from last 2019, all doing well). The wildlife pack will be a double row hedge around one edge of the top field and will also improve safety here by acting as a barrier to a steep slope. The next job will be to mulch them all with cardboard and woodchip, if we can get hold of some!

As land manager, I led the planting sessions and was helped by our 2 wonderful residential winter volunteers. They loved the tree planting and felt happy to be contributing to a great initiative. Thank you so much for supplying us with the trees. I was very impressed with the service, they came exactly when expected, the trees were in excellent condition with damp roots and in fact I think there were a couple more trees than we bargained for! We have a population of rabbits on site, so the tree guards were a must.
